### OEF/OIF Care Management Service

*It is VA policy that severely injured or ill OEF and OIF active duty service members are transitioned seamlessly from military treatment facilities to VA facilities.*

OEF/OIF veterans have the option to receive care management services.

Care Managers serve as linkage to care professionals assisting veterans in accessing available services at your local VA, such as:

- Primary medical care
- Specialty medical care
- Surgery care
- Rehabilitation care
- Mental health care
- Transitional and readjustment counseling
- Veterans' employment assistance
- Education and referrals
- Community resources
- Polytrauma/TBI Care Management

### What Is Severely Injured?

Veterans with any of the following conditions:

- Amputation
- Traumatic Brain Injury
- Spinal Cord Injury
- Blindness
- Burn Injury
- Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder
- Incurable or Fatal Disease
- Psychiatric Condition that occurred after September 11, 2001, that may result in a disability rating of 30% or greater
